Unanimous Consent Agreement

Ordered, That when the Senate considers the nomination of Carol T. Crawford to be a Member of the U. S. International Trade Commission, it be considered under the following time limitation: one hour for debate on the nomination to be divided as follows: 20 minutes for the Senator from West Virginia (Mr. Rockefeller), 18 minutes for the Senator from Oregon (Mr. Packwood), 10 minutes for the Senator from Michigan (Mr. Riegle), five minutes for the Senator from Missouri (Mr. Danforth), five minutes for the Senator from Kansas (Mr. Dole) and two minutes for the Senator from Pennsylvania (Mr. Specter); that if any Senator does not use his allotted time it be yielded back to the floor managers, the Chairman and Ranking Member of the Finance Committee; and that upon the use or yielding back of time the Senate, without any intervening action, vote on, or in relation to, the nomination.

Ordered, further, That if the nomination is confirmed the Senate then proceed to the immediate consideration of the nomination of Janet A. Nuzum to be a Member of the U. S. International Trade Commission; that the nomination be deemed confirmed without debate; that the motions to reconsider be tabled en bloc; that the President be immediately notified of the action of the Senate; and that the Senate return to legislative session.
